

#### Pastor Seth Jersild Notes for Quarterly Meeting Report St. John's Lutheran Church April 24-25, 2021

- Church attendance at all services is rising. I was inspired and uplifted by St. John's worship and praise on Easter. I'm so thankful to God for the vaccines!
- We are prepared to see attendance fluctuate depending on what people are hearing and reading in the news regarding new waves of Covid-19. We'll continue with our current worship schedule, communion practices and face-covering routines for the time being, staying aware of governmental guidelines and community trends. Church council is setting the policies for distancing guidelines, and possible church closures.
- I want to thank the congregation once again for your beautiful generosity and support for St. John's ministry through these challenging times. Your prayers and encouragement have meant so much to all of the church staff!
- In mid-May, I'll start offering a 9:30 a.m. Sunday school class (between services) in the basement Fellowship Hall for anyone who would like to attend. Discussion will be casual; we'll focus on a particular book of the Bible.
- In late May, I'll start a Sunday-night Bible Study (6:30-8:00 p.m.) in the Family Life Center, on the book of 1<sup>st</sup> Corinthians.
- A new "Going Deeper" packet on Worship and Praise (based on selected Psalms) will be distributed on the weekend of May 23<sup>rd</sup>.
- Plans are in the works for some events at church this summer and fall (depending on virus conditions) to help people reconnect with our ministry and fellowship at church after what has been a long period of physical separation for many.
- We're putting together an attractive invitation and mini-brochure for St. John's that we
  can distribute (by mail and neighborhood walk-through) to new families in Grove City.
  This will become one of my regular emphases in the coming years. Helpers in this effort
  will be much appreciated.
- Our youth education programs (Sunday school, confirmation, high school) continue to be conducted almost exclusively online right now, with good participation.
- Our Sunday School adult volunteers are actively monitoring the community virus situation and are in regular communication with each other, regarding the possibility of returning to in-person classes in the fall.
- We are sad that Dr. John Schuder, our organist and choir director, will be leaving us at the end of June. What a gift from God John has been to our congregation! Though we

will miss him dearly, we are very excited for him as he looks forward to life in Maine. Stay tuned for a special farewell event early this summer.

- A search team has been formed and is now actively searching for candidates to fill a
  Director of Music Ministry position at St. John's. We are working to find temporary
  organists to fill in the weeks after Dr. John departs at the end of June.
- We have welcomed a wonderful new Administrative Assistant to our church staff: Kathryn Mullins. Kathryn will have regular hours (8:00-4:00) on Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. Welcome, Kathryn! Jan Miller will continue to serve as our Church Recorder, and will be in the church office regularly on Tuesdays and Fridays. We are so thankful for Jan's loving guidance through this time of transition, and for her continuing service to St. John's!
- A tech team is being formed to assess "big-picture" audio-visual needs and possibilities for St. John's in the future. If you would like to participate in this team, let me know!
- A three-day in-person Vacation Bible School is being planned for early July.
- The Chapel Sunday morning class is again available for adults, in-person, at 9:30 each week. They're meeting in 103-4. We are thankful to Pastor Don for leading the group right now in a discussion of the book of Revelation. Other in-person Sunday morning classes will get started as their teachers become available.
- Hospitals and nursing homes continue to change their visitation policies almost weekly
  right now, and this often affects our ability to make predictable in-person pastoral calls at
  these institutions. We're doing everything we can to reach out to our members who are
  having surgeries and who are hospitalized. We always appreciate it when people notify
  us that members have been hospitalized or are dealing with health issues.
- My quest to visit all the member households of St. John's was stymied by the quarantine, but is now resuming as a greater number of people are feeling less tentative about having visitors in their homes. This is a long-term goal and I'm confident about completing it.
- Staff and administrative duties are proceeding well.
- As always, I am available for conversation and/or pastoral care, any time (217.255.2118)

### Accessibility

Our church facility presents many challenges and barriers for those who have mobility issues. It is difficult to get into the sanctuary because of steps at both entrances and if you want to go up the ramp, you must go outside in the weather; rest room facilities are not readily available if stairs are a problem for a person in the sanctuary; it is difficult to move between the FLC and sanctuary, etc.

A small team, focused on accessibility, has been sanctioned by council to look at the barriers our facility presents for those with mobility issues. The team has been meeting for a couple of months. The team has developed a prioritized list of issues to be considered for improvement. In the next couple of weeks we will be meeting with architects in an effort to choose an expert with experience in accessibility solutions and expertise in historical buildings. The next several months will be spent working with the chosen architect who will develop a feasibility study for our issues. When the feasibility study is complete, we should have some options from which to choose, estimated cost, phases of implementation and sketches of what will be proposed. The intent is to present to the congregation, at the annual meetings, a recommendation strategy for implementation.

Over the course of the next 9 months I am sure that expectations and solutions will be ever evolving. We will do our best to update the congregation at the quarterly congregational meetings.

## YOUTH STAFF QUARTERLY REPORT APRIL 2021

Our summer brochure was given to families in their requested materials for April/May. The brochure was distributed through mail, email, and can be picked up at the entrances of the church. We are moving forward with plans with DWA Recreation/GameTime to put in swings to the left of the smaller playground. Special thanks to Jennifer Uhrin, Nate Wanner, Butch Myers, and Mike Esposito for your assistance on this project. We anticipate the project to cost around \$17,000. The youth designated budget currently has \$12,600 specifically earmarked for the playground. Plus, a generous memorial of \$4,000 will make this project possible. By mid-summer, we hope to have two bays of swings -- one bay will have two swings for youth; the other bay will have two swings for toddlers. We are also putting a new park bench next to the swing set.

## Business Manager Report April 2021

- The new ceiling lights for the 2nd of the Education Building are all in place and donations to pay for them are over half way.
- Donations are coming in for the purchase of new chairs for the Family Life Center. I am looking at the same style chair with the exception that the seat in plywood, not compressed board. You cannot get the compressed board wet when trying to clean the current chairs. They fall apart. The seat cover will be vinyl rather than cloth. But none of this is be settled on until the Contemporary Service leaders and our members see the options and pick what they want. The current chairs have been used since the FLC was completed. 25-26 years.
- The process of getting quotes for gutter guard for the FLC gutters has been started. This includes the Link and the gutters on both sides of the FLC classrooms. We are considering putting heat strips above or in the gutters during the winter to keep the gutters from freezing over.
- I am working with Wayne Beavers regarding what can be done to make the church balcony railing safer.
- I have been in contact with the Landscaping Committee regarding any information they need prior to proceeding with their plans.
- Finally, the shelter-house has been opened up for use for Spring, Summer and Fall. As we are still limiting access to the building by groups who use the shelter house a portable restroom has been rented as last year, to be used by groups using the shelter house.
