GUIDELINES AND SUGGESTIONS FOR “DEEP WATER” SMALL GROUPS

- Try to keep your group size from two to six people. The larger the group, the more time it will take at each meeting for everyone to participate and share actively.
- Try to meet together once a week, on average.
- Meet in a place that is conducive to listening and speaking. Loud, crowded restaurants, for example, will probably not work too well.
- Everyone should bring a bible, a pen, and this packet to each of their small group meetings.
- This packet, focusing on the Psalms, has enough material to cover 13 weeks’ worth of meetings. On New Years Day 2022, a new packet of materials will become available for the next part of our “deeper water” journey.
- **Buffer weeks:** We are adding *two additional weeks* to this session, so that **you have sixteen weeks in which to cover 14 weeks’ worth of materials**. Your group can use these extra two weeks to 1) catch up if your group has to miss a weekly meeting or two, or 2) If your discussions go long on some weeks, you can use the extra time to spread things out and/or backtrack as necessary. Also, the two buffer weeks will naturally coincide this time around with a break around Christmas.
- While it is not a requirement, we recommend that men partner with men, and women partner with women.
- You do not need to designate any particular person in your group to be a facilitator or leader. Just follow the materials together and agree on a time limit to your meetings.
- Allow extended silences to happen during your small group discussions. The bible is a challenging book and the Word can sometimes shake our thoughts up at first before bringing them around towards Christ. Silence allows time for the Spirit to give us speech.
- While you are discussing with your group, always jot down thoughts that the group shares.
- It is likely that you will encounter different Bible translations within your group. If the group feels this is an obstacle to understanding or discussion, discuss the possibility of procuring bibles of the same translation for everyone. The New Revised Standard Version, which St. John’s uses at worship, is an example of a well-balanced, readable and accurate translation. Call Pastor Seth (217.255.2118) or Pastor Patti (614.875.2314) if you need any help or guidance regarding Bible translations.
- On January 1, 2022 we will start a new topic in our Deep Water journey. Every time we begin a new topic (about every two-three months), small groups and partnerships can reconfigure themselves as necessary. As you approach the end of each topic, please talk intentionally about how and whether your group will continue into the next topic together intact, or what changes you need to make based on your personal schedules, etc. While we encourage everyone to plug in to as much of our deep water journey as possible through the next few years, we also understand that some of us will need to drop out and rejoin at various points in the journey.

THE MOST IMPORTANT PRINCIPLE TO OBSERVE IN YOUR SMALL GROUP: CONFIDENTIALITY

Keeping things confidential is vital to establishing trust and open communication with your partner or small group. Be sure to acknowledge this rule clearly with each other at the beginning of your journey together, and regularly over the course of the following weeks. What is said in your small group should stay in your small group!

REMEMBER: PEOPLE WHO ARE NOT MEMBERS OF ST. JOHN'S ARE WELCOME TO PARTICIPATE IN THIS JOURNEY!

We encourage you to invite non-members to participate. Think of a friend with whom you'd like to take this journey, and invite them to jump in.

Into Deeper Water with the Apostles' Creed
WEEK #1 SMALL GROUP MEETING
Target Week: September 12-18

1. Confirm as a group what your time limit is going to be. Over time, each group will develop a natural feel for what kind of pace they need to maintain in order to fit everyone's schedules.
2. Please review the material under the heading "Healthy Small Groups" together, above.
3. Emphasize together the crucial importance of keeping what you share in this group confidential. Also, make sure you have each others' phone numbers, email addresses, and etc. for communication purposes.
4. Please note our practice of adding **buffer weeks** for each topic (from the "Healthy Small Groups" section, above). Remember, you will have 16 weeks in which to cover 14 weeks' worth of meetings.

5. OPENING PRAYER

- Designate someone to pray the prayer in italics, below. Always feel free to improvise as the Spirit moves you. You can use the written prayer loosely, as a model. Special intercessions can be added.

Heavenly Father, thank you for bringing us together to study the Creed and to grow in our appreciation of your powerful Word. Thank you for sending Jesus into our lives for our salvation, and for the new life and power that you pour into us through the Holy Spirit. Protect, heal, and uphold all those for whom we have special concerns today. Give us courage to go into deeper water in order to be more effective witnesses to Christ. We pray in his name. Amen.

6. Spend about 5 minutes having everyone share high points and low points from the last several days.
7. Have someone in your group read the following aloud (or better yet, break it up among different readers):

*During the next sixteen weeks, we'll be discussing the Apostles' Creed. **The Creed summarizes all of God's work in creation and human history as taught in the Bible.***

All orthodox Christians (of all denominations throughout the world) subscribe to the three ecumenical Creeds of the Christian church:

- *The Apostles' Creed*
- *The Nicene Creed*
- *The Athanasian Creed*

None of these creeds are explicitly written anywhere in scripture. So why does the Church have creeds?

From the very beginning of the Church, people have interpreted the Biblical witness differently, leading some to promulgate ideas which have contradicted the good news of Jesus.

*The word we use for ideas or concepts which misrepresent God is “heresy.” In short, heresy takes what is supposed to be good news about God and makes it into bad news for everyone. We can compare heresy to when someone speaks falsely about someone we love. For example, instead of proclaiming that our only hope for salvation is God’s free grace and forgiveness in Christ, often people pervert this message to say things like “Jesus saves you, but only if you follow the rules.” Most heresy is the result of people trying to add something **we do** to what only God can do for us. Heresy makes us big, and makes God small.*

*Early on, leaders of the Church, inspired by the Holy Spirit, realized that in the face of constant human temptation to “cherry pick” our preferred ideas from the Bible and pervert the message of the gospel, it was necessary to come together and compose brief, baseline formulations of true Christian faith, based on the **total witness** of Holy Scripture. They knew that we needed some basic statements of the true faith. We can disagree on all sorts of things in this world, but on **these essential truths** about who God is and what he’s done for us, we must agree.*

The three main ecumenical (cross-denominational) creeds, were composed early in church history, but at different times. The Apostles’ Creed (the earliest) is relatively short, the Nicene Creed is a little longer, and the Athanasian Creed (the latest creed) is the longest. Each creed was composed to speak to the biggest and newest heresies of its time. Each is rooted in the same faith in Christ, but the Nicene and Athanasian creeds elaborated on the basics in order to speak to developing challenges.

Besides being basic doctrinal statements of the Christian faith, you’ll notice that we use the creeds in worship as corporate statements of faith, in response to the good news of Jesus. At St. John’s we say the creed together, usually right after the sermon. They are a beautiful public witness to the Holy Trinity. When we say the Apostles’ Creed together, we are acknowledging not only God’s act of salvation for us in Jesus, and also expressing the unity into which he has brought us as believers. Finally, the creeds are excellent teaching tools for all Christians. As we study the Apostles’ Creed together through these weeks, it will be an opportunity for us to grow “in the Spirit of wisdom and revelation, so that we may know him better, and know the hope to which he has called us.”

8. Discuss the following questions together as a group.

- What, in the above material about the creeds of the church, strikes you the most (if anything), and why?
- What questions might you have about the ecumenical creeds of the Christian Church?
- Have you ever witnessed someone misrepresenting God, either verbally or in writing? What was the situation? What false picture of God do you think they were painting?
- Why is it so important to us that others speak the truth about people we admire, love, and care about? How can this help us understand the need for creeds in the Church?
- Can you think of a time when you’ve witnessed someone “cherry-picking” things out of Holy Scripture to justify their agenda or position on some issue? What was the situation?
- What are your thoughts, feelings and impressions of how we say the Apostles’ Creed together during worship...usually right after the sermon? In your own words, why do we do it? Why is it important?

9. Have someone read the following out loud (or better yet, divide it up for different people to read):

When discussing the Apostles' Creed, it is helpful to make a distinction between (a) natural revelation and (b) special revelation.

To some extent, we can learn about God as our Creator through our own experience of the world. Creation witnesses to God, his goodness, and his power. The human conscience also witnesses to God and his righteousness. Being able to know God through our own experience falls under the heading of "natural revelation." In short, we can know some things about God without being told anything special about him. Just looking at the mountains, the sky, the ocean, the forests—these can be enough to give us the impression that a good and loving God is behind it all. Also, scripture attests to the fact that most humans seem to have a conscience "built in" to them, and that this is a sign of God's hand in our lives, even though we are broken by sin. Our inborn sense of good and evil (conscience) points to the reality of God. Please read the following verses and discuss what they tell us about "natural revelation."

- Psalm 19:1
- Acts 14:17
- Romans 1:20
- Romans 2:15

On the other hand, we also see things in creation and experience things in life that might lead us to question whether there is a Creator at all, much less whether he is good! For example, what's the point of deadly parasites? The food chain—where each life-form is always feeding off of others for its own survival—makes the world look like a dog-eat-dog place. The seeming "waste" of so much life in nature—with millions of eggs becoming food so that just a few fish can be born—can make the world seem like a cruel and arbitrary place (where individual lives mean very little). Looking at the violence and vastness of the universe might convince us that human beings mean nothing. We see birth defects and horrible diseases and childhood cancer. To say nothing of how human beings can treat each other—and how many human lives seem wasted and meaningless to the point where we are tempted to despair. In short, our experience of life and the world might very well lead us to NOT believe that there is a good and loving God in charge of it all. Thus, natural revelation can only bring us so far when it comes to our understanding of who God is.

- *With your small-group partners, discuss things in the world that you think can drive people to disbelief and/or lack of trust in God. Have people ever given you reasons for their unfaith? Discuss experiences you personally have had that may have tested your belief in the goodness of God.*

*Continue reading aloud: This is where, for Jews and Christians, **special revelation** comes in. The Apostles' Creed is almost entirely devoted to God's special revelation in history, centered around Jesus Christ. The First Article of the Creed (**I believe in God the Father almighty**), is pretty wide open and certainly allows for natural revelation to inform our knowledge of the creator. But even our knowledge of God as Creator, as Christians, is completely shaped by things that God has done in history and "given to us" as gifts, so that we can know him clearly for who he is. For example, there*

are many religions that picture a creator God, but the first chapter of Genesis tells us many things about God that are very different from what other religions say about him. In a sense, special revelation is God's way of shaping our understanding and knowledge of him by intervening in our lives, and doing and saying particular things so that we can know him in truth. He literally enters into history and becomes part of human life—he tells us a story about himself through his real interactions with us—so that we can know him. He chooses particular people (e.g. Israel) through whom he will show himself, so that everyone can see who he is through his specific dealings with them. In a sense, God says “if you look at the story of Israel that I give to you, you will come to know who I am.”

*Special revelation refers to special things that God has done and said in history to show himself clearly to human beings. The Bible is the recorded witness to God's acts in history. It tells the story of God repeatedly intervening in human affairs to save them from themselves. The Bible itself is an **intervention** by God into our lives. Such revelation is “special” in the sense that God barges into our lives in order to give us information about himself that we would never grasp on our own through our experience of life and the world. We can be sure that God will always be much more than the things he has shown us about himself through special revelation—but through special revelation he gives us **enough** of himself (all that we need) out of love.*

- Please Go over the Apostles' Creed as a group and spend some time discussing how every statement within the creed is based on some particular action that God has taken in history. In short, how is the Apostles' Creed completely based on *Special Revelation*? Another angle on this: as we go through the Creed, we can ask, “Would we come to any of these beliefs on our own without the witness of scripture to God's acts in history?”

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended into hell. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

- As a group, note how the Creed is structured on the name of God (Father, Son, and Holy Spirit).

10. In turn, without going into too much depth about each situation, share one or two specific issues that you would like your partner(s) to pray about for you this week. Write down your partner(s) concerns, below, *and be sure to pray for them!* Use this opportunity to express your commitment to support and care for each other in this journey.

11. Remind each other that there's homework to do (below) before each group meeting. The homework material provides the substance for each group meeting. Confirm the time and place of your next gathering. Review whether you will be “doubling up” on homework at any point if you are not able to meet weekly, etc.

12. Close with prayer. Today, have one person volunteer to pray for the group. Try to include elements of your discussion from this meeting in your prayer. Include a prayer for the power of the Holy Spirit to guide your group and fill you with confidence and determination as you get started on this journey together.

HOMEWORK FOR YOUR NEXT (2nd) SMALL GROUP MEETING

1. Find a place where you can concentrate. Say the following prayer *aloud*; always feel free to add extra petitions and thanks.

Almighty Father, I praise you for having fashioned me in love and set me within this world, which you have created. For all that you have given me in body and soul, and for the ways you take care of me, I give you thanks. Keep me mindful of your gifts. Help me to look to you for all that I need. Teach me to receive your gifts as a grateful child; through Jesus Christ, your Son. Amen.

2. We'll start this week by exploring the difference between (a) natural revelation and (b) special revelation a little further. Why is this distinction important for the Church to understand and think about these days? Please read the following critically and be prepared to agree, disagree, and respond to it.

With today's emphasis on personal experience, people are relying almost completely on *natural revelation* (without any intervention from outside) for any understanding of God. This means, among other things, that rather than having respect for traditional authorities (like the Bible or religious teachers, church etc.), people tend to reject anything that smacks of "tradition" in favor of immediate experience. They prefer to figure things out on their own, based on their personal experience of life.

This is why many people's conception of God today is built on a loose smattering of materials and sound-bites. Rather than understanding the story of God like a huge oak tree, with roots and a trunk and branches and leaves, people are more likely to carry a loose bag of religious "leaves" around with them. They pick up these leaves in the course of time, often without knowing where they came from. They will pull out a leaf (like a sound bite) when they need to bolster their own position in the moment, (for example "don't judge other people"), but they will not relate that single leaf of biblical truth to the roots of the biblical story from which it grew. Thus, while our culture today still *looks* like it is infused with many Jewish/Christian values and concepts (in the form of loose leaves), it is actually only a surface-appearance of Christianity which is now rooted in something deeper: a *humanistic*, non-biblical world-view.

Much of the fragmentation of religious ideas and beliefs in our popular culture today is due to a modern *humanistic* assumption: that the individual human being, guided by his/her own lights, is the judge and jury on all things. Truth is rooted in *personal experience*. This means that "God," for many people, is a concept which will (or will not) fit into their lives based on what they find useful, what they want, or what they feel they need.

As long as we start with the assumption that "I am the center, the judge, and the final jury on what my truth is," it doesn't matter how hard or deeply we study any religious materials—we will probably end up in the same place we started. For example, think of how many modern parents decide to let their

children “make their own decisions” about religious truth. Parents who take this position are not actually teaching their children to make choices; on the contrary they are actively teaching their children the humanist world-view. With these assumptions being taught in the home, it is highly unlikely that children will “choose” Jesus as the Way, the Truth, and the Life. Instead, they are more likely to see Jesus as an *option*.

The point is that if we *start* as humanists, then no matter what we learn, we will continue to believe that every person has their own truth, and therefore we will not really submit ourselves in faith to any truth that we think is “bigger” than we are. There is a huge difference between believing in our own truths and actually submitting ourselves in faith to a reality that is bigger and more powerful than we are.

It follows that there is powerful resistance to *being told* anything by anyone. We become perpetually suspicious of what other people say. This makes it especially challenging for God’s Church to witness to God’s Word in scripture and teach the story of God (as given to us in scripture) to others. Please look at the following questions and be prepared to discuss them with your group:

- Often, people’s first response to being told or taught about God (or anything, for that matter) is to be resistant and skeptical right off the bat. What dynamics in our culture right now do you think are contributing to this attitude?
- Think of how a dependence on *natural revelation* might lead to a huge variety of different notions about God’s character. For example, how might a person in who is exposed to violence and exploitation throughout their childhood in an impoverished country come to a different picture of God’s character based on “natural revelation” than a person who was raised in a safe suburban neighborhood in Ohio?
- In what ways do you see Christian congregations, as they have typically functioned in American culture since World War II, struggling to adjust to new realities when it comes to people’s basic attitudes towards life, God and humanity?
- In what ways might you agree or disagree with the diagnosis given in the above paragraphs, regarding our culture today? How would you personally modify or expand upon the above diagnosis?
- How do you think Christians today can more effectively speak to and engage people who are so suspicious about truth claims and authority in general? What kind of general approaches to evangelism and outreach for Jesus do you think will be more effective in today’s world than simply saying “join us for worship!”

3. This week, we begin looking at the First Article of the Apostles’ Creed:

I believe in God the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Please read **Genesis 2:7-25** and respond to the items below.

- Without knowing God or believing in any purposeful creative will behind the universe, in what different ways might people answer the question: “what is a human being?”
- How does seeing myself as *God’s creature* fundamentally shape my relationship to him, my understanding of myself, and my purpose in this world?

4. Please read the following passages and, in your own words, express the slightly different things each passage tells us about God as the *Father*.

- John 3:16
- Galatians 4:4-6
- Acts 17:28-29

5. Different religions depict the Creator God in different ways. For example, for Muslims, the proper relationship between God and humans is “master-servant.” For Buddhists and Hindus, the relationship between us and ultimate reality is not personal. In what ways is our understanding of God as “Father” so different from these examples?

6. Read **John 8:34-36**. In your own words, what is this passage saying about being God’s own child, versus being a “slave” in God’s house? How do you apply this to your own life as a Christian?

7. What do the following passages tell us about God the *Creator*.

- **Genesis 1:1**. In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth.
- **Psalm 115:15-16**. May you be blessed by the Lord, who made heaven and earth. The heavens are the Lord’s heavens, but the earth he has given to human beings.
- **Isaiah 36-37** (from your Bible)

Your response:

8. When we say that our Father created all things, we’re acknowledging that *only the one who created heaven and earth can make his creation new again*. Please reflect on the following passages and express in your own words how they witness to this truth.

- **2 Peter 3:13.** But, in accordance with his promise, we wait for new heavens and a new earth, where righteousness is at home.
- **Revelation 21:5.** And the one who was seated on the throne said, “See, I am making all things new.” Also he said, “Write this, for these words are trustworthy and true.”
- **John 1:1-3.** In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being.
- **Romans 8:18-23.** I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us. For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God; for the creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now; and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies.

Your response:

- What do the passages above tell us, ultimately, about *our power* as human beings to bring the world to balance and perfection?

9. If we are in a personal, father/child relationship with God, we also acknowledge our infinite indebtedness and gratitude to him for life. Read **Psalm 139:13-14**, **James 1:17-18**, and **Genesis 1:31**.

- What are these passages telling us about our relationship with God, and what it means regarding our *accountability* to him?
- If a person does not believe in the Creator or looks at their creator as a distant impersonal force, how might this affect their sense of *gratitude* towards life?
- How might not believing in a *good* creator affect a person’s general sense of the *value* of life and the world in which we live?

10. Look back at what you wrote down with your partner(s) regarding their prayer concerns from your first group meeting. Make sure to pray for them now. Among your other closing prayers, please ask God to bless your small group and the congregation of St. John’s as we follow Jesus’ call to go into the deep water with Christ and become more confident, effective “fishers of people.”

WEEK #2 SMALL GROUP MEETING
Target Week: September 19-25

1. Spend about 5 minutes sharing highs and lows of the past few days.
2. Someone pray the following prayer, (or use it loosely as a model for a spontaneous prayer):
Heavenly Father, we thank you for bringing us together today to study your Word and to support each other in our walk of faith. Help us to listen to each other with open hearts and minds. We thank you for the new life and forgiveness you have given us in Christ, and we pray that you will remove all fear from our hearts as we follow your call to let go of our old lives, that we may live for you alone. In Jesus' name, Amen.
3. Please go back to the homework you all did for this session, starting on **page 8**. Discuss the material as a group. After you finish, return here and continue with item #4, below.
4. In turn, without going into too much depth about each situation, share one or two specific issues that you would like your partner(s) to pray about for you this week. Write down your partner(s) concerns, below, *and be sure to pray for them!* Use this opportunity to express your commitment to support and care for each other in this journey.
5. Confirm the time and place of your next meeting. Review whether you will be “doubling up” on homework at any point if you are not able to meet weekly, etc.
6. Close with prayer. Today, have one person volunteer to pray for the group. Try to include elements of your discussion from this meeting in your prayer. HOMEWORK FOR YOUR NEXT (3rd) SMALL GROUP MEETING

1. Find a place where you can concentrate. Say the following prayer *aloud*; always feel free to add extra petitions and thanks.
Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me. Cast me not away from your presence, and take not your holy spirit from me. Restore to me the joy of your salvation, and uphold me with your free spirit. Make me an agent of your love towards all. In Jesus' name. Amen.
2. This week, we will continue our discussion of the First Article of the Apostles' Creed, and make some everyday connections and applications.

I believe in God the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

3. In your own words, what are the following verses telling us about *how* God created everything.

- **Genesis 1:1, 3, 31.** In the beginning when God created[a] the heavens and the earth, Then God said, “Let there be light”; and there was light. God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good. And there was evening and there was morning, the sixth day.
- **Psalm 33:6, 9.** By the word of the Lord the heavens were made, and all their host by the breath of his mouth. For he spoke, and it came to be; he commanded, and it stood firm.

Your response:

4. As believers, how shall we consider other competing accounts of how the world came into existence? We should evaluate the assumptions they use, determine the reason for these assumptions, and consider whether they lead to unbiblical conclusions. For example:

Many ancient and modern views assume that the universe always existed and thus all gods and beings arise from it and exist on a spectrum of deity. This leads one to assume that everything is in some way divine or part of divinity, thus confusing the Creator and his creation (for example, folk religions, pantheism, and polytheism). Mystical religions like Hinduism and Buddhism fall into this category.

Atheistic theories (that openly deny the existence of God) assume that the Bible is not the Word of God and the universe is closed with no possibility of outside intervention. This invites the conclusion that the world and universe have no special meaning or purpose. This approach also suggests that there is no absolute truth and that all human relationships, such as marriage, are simply arrangements of convenience that can be changed as cultures or individuals desire.

Many **agnostic** understandings of the origin of the world (which say “there might be a creator but we don’t know”) see the universe as *perhaps* reflecting the hand of a creator. But like atheists, they tend not to see God actively involved in the workings of the universe or as a loving power who intervenes in the world. According to them, if a divine power was involved in the creation of the universe, the power is so beyond our knowledge or so hidden that we cannot see it. Meanwhile, the universe follows impersonal physical rules (e.g. natural selection, physics) that were there from the beginning without intervention or involvement from any power from outside.

- Have you encountered any of the above described beliefs regarding the origin of the universe? Make note of your experiences below and be prepared to share them with your group.
- If we believe that we all exist at different points along a “spectrum of divinity” (i.e. some people and life-forms are closer to ultimate reality, and others farther from it) what might we start thinking of other people who have different abilities or characteristics than we do?

- If the universe is indeed a closed book and there is nothing higher than what we can observe with our senses, what implications does this have for our moral codes and beliefs (see the thoughts under “atheistic theories”)?

5. Read the following passages and express in your own words what each says about the specialness of human beings in relation to all other creatures.

- **Genesis 1:26-27.** Then God said, “Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness; and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the wild animals of the earth, and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth.” So God created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them.
- **John 1:14, 16.** And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father’s only son, full of grace and truth.
- **Philippians 2:5-7.** Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness.

Your response:

6. In your own words, what do the following passages say about the value of every single human life?

- **Ephesians 1:7.** In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of his grace
- **Hebrews 9:12.** He entered once for all into the Holy Place, not with the blood of goats and calves, but with his own blood, thus obtaining eternal redemption.

7. Please read the following passages and express in your own words what they are saying about the basic dignity of all people, even though we are all in bondage to sin and cannot free ourselves.

- **Genesis 9:6.** Whoever sheds the blood of a human, by a human shall that person’s blood be shed; for in his own image God made humankind.
- **James 3:9.** With it [our tongues] we bless the Lord and Father, and with it we curse those who are made in the likeness of God.

8. Will we ever regain the image of God that has been twisted beyond recognition in us by sin? Yes. In Christ, the restoration of God’s image in us has begun, but in this life it is only a beginning, and will

- **Colossians 3:10.** [You] have clothed yourselves with the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge according to the image of its creator.
- **Ephesians 4:24.** ...to be renewed in the spirit of your minds, and to clothe yourselves with the new self, created according to the likeness of God in true righteousness and holiness.
- **2 Corinthians 3:18.** And all of us, with unveiled faces, seeing the glory of the Lord as though reflected in a mirror, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another; for this comes from the Lord, the Spirit.

9. We know that God has created all other creatures on earth, with human beings in the special role as God's representatives [stewards/priests] for all. We can think of "being made in God's image" as being God's "stand-ins" in the created world. Out of the ground the Lord God formed every animal of the field and every bird of the air, and brought them to the man to see what he would call them; and whatever the man called every living creature, that was its name.
- **Genesis 9:3.** Every moving thing that lives shall be food for you; and just as I gave you the green plants, I give you everything.
- **Psalms 148** (from your Bible)

- Do we become angels when we die?
- Are we to look to angels for direction in our lives or pray to them?

- Do I have a personal guardian angel (does scripture answer this question directly)?
- Does scripture picture angels guarding over us?

- Jeremiah 23:23-24. Am I a God near by, says the Lord, and not a God far off? Who can hide in secret places so that I cannot see them? says the Lord. Do I not fill heaven and earth? says the Lord.
- Acts 17:26-28. From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him—though indeed he is not far from each one of us. For 'In him we live and move and have our being'; as even some of your own poets have said, 'For we too are his offspring.'
- Job 12:10. In his hand is the life of every living thing and the breath of every human being.
- Hebrews 1:3. He is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being, and he sustains all things by his powerful word. When he had made purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high,
- Psalm 147:8-9. He covers the heavens with clouds, prepares rain for the earth, makes grass grow on the hills. He gives to the animals their food, and to the young ravens when they cry.

Your response:

6. Reflect on the following passages, and let them guide your response to the question: *If our gracious Creator provides for all of our needs and protects us from all evil, why do suffering and death exist in the world?*

- **James 1:14-15.** But one is tempted by one's own desire, being lured and enticed by it; then, when that desire has conceived, it gives birth to sin, and that sin, when it is fully grown, gives birth to death
- **John 8:44.** You are from your father the devil, and you choose to do your father's desires. He was a murderer from the beginning and does not stand in the truth, because there is no truth in him. When he lies, he speaks according to his own nature, for he is a liar and the father of lies.
- **Romans 5:12.** Therefore, just as sin came into the world through one man, and death came through sin, and so death spread to all because all have sinned.
- **Genesis 3:17-19.** And to the man he said, because you have listened to the voice of your wife, and have eaten of the tree about which I commanded you, 'You shall not eat of it,' cursed is the ground because of you; in toil you shall eat of it all the days of your life; thorns and thistles it shall bring forth for you; and you shall eat the plants of the field. By the sweat of your face you shall eat bread until you return to the ground, for out of it you were taken; you are dust, and to dust you shall return."
- **Romans 8:20-22.** for the creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now;

7. Please Read **Luke 13:1-5** and express in your own words what Jesus is saying about tragic suffering sometimes being a call to *repentance*.

8. Some of us clearly experience more suffering and misfortune than others. Scripture acknowledges both that (a) we can bring suffering upon ourselves through our own behavior, and that (b) a lot of suffering is unexplainable—the reason remains hidden in God, whose purposes are often beyond our understanding (just as those who saw Jesus suffer were not at the time aware of God's great and loving purpose behind the cross). Please reflect on the following passages and let them guide your response to the question: "*Why do some of us experience more suffering and misfortune than others?*"

- **Galatians 6:7.** Do not be deceived; God is not mocked, for you reap whatever you sow.
- **James 4:1-2.** Those conflicts and disputes among you, where do they come from? Do they not come from your cravings that are at war within you? You want something and do not have it; so you commit murder. And you covet something and cannot obtain it; so you engage in disputes and conflicts. You do not have, because you do not ask.
- **2 Samuel 12:1-15.** (from your Bible)
- **Isaiah 55:8-9.** For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts.

- **Deuteronomy 29:29.** The secret things belong to the Lord our God, but the revealed things belong to us and to our children forever, to observe all the words of this law.
- **Romans 9:19-23** (from your Bible)

Your response:

9. What do the following passages tell us about how we can/should respond to suffering...to other people's, and our own?

- **Psalm 130:1-2.** Out of the depths I cry to you, O Lord. Lord, hear my voice! Let your ears be attentive to the voice of my supplications!
- **Psalm 90:13-15.** Turn, O Lord! How long? Have compassion on your servants! Satisfy us in the morning with your steadfast love, so that we may rejoice and be glad all our days. Make us glad as many days as you have afflicted us, and as many years as we have seen evil.
- **1 Peter 4:12-13, 19.** Beloved, do not be surprised at the fiery ordeal that is taking place among you to test you, as though something strange were happening to you. But rejoice insofar as you are sharing Christ's sufferings, so that you may also be glad and shout for joy when his glory is revealed. Therefore, let those suffering in accordance with God's will entrust themselves to a faithful Creator, while continuing to do good.

Your response:

10. Please reflect on the following passages and let them guide your response to the question: "*What is God doing about all the suffering and death in the world?*"

- **Genesis 8:21b-22.** The Lord said in his heart, "I will never again curse the ground because of humankind, for the inclination of the human heart is evil from youth; nor will I ever again destroy every living creature as I have done. As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night, shall not cease."
- **Acts 14:16-17.** In past generations he allowed all the nations to follow their own ways; yet he has not left himself without a witness in doing good—giving you rains from heaven and fruitful seasons, and filling you with food and your hearts with joy."
- **Romans 5:8.** But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us.
- **Isaiah 53:3-4.** He was despised and rejected by others; a man of suffering and acquainted with infirmity; and as one from whom others hide their faces he was despised, and we held him of no account. Surely he has borne our infirmities and carried our diseases; yet we accounted him stricken, struck down by God, and afflicted.
- **John 11:25.** Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live."
- **Romans 5:3-5.** And not only that, but we also boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us.

- **Romans 8:28-29.** We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose. For those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, in order that he might be the firstborn within a large family
- **Revelation 21:4.** he will wipe every tear from their eyes. Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more, for the first things have passed away.”

- John 14:9. Jesus said to him, “Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, ‘Show us the Father’?”
- 1 Timothy 2:5-6. For there is one God; there is also one mediator between God and humankind, Christ Jesus, himself human, who gave himself a ransom for all

- 1 John 2:1. My little children, I am writing these things to you so that you may not sin. But if anyone does sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous;
- Matthew 28:18. And Jesus came and said to them, “All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me.”
- Ephesians 4:10. He who descended is the same one who ascended far above all the heavens, so that he might fill all things.
- John 5:21-23. Indeed, just as the Father raises the dead and gives them life, so also the Son gives life to whomever he wishes. - **2 Corinthians 5:19.** that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us.

- **John 8:34-36.** Jesus answered them, "Very truly, I tell you, everyone who commits sin is a slave to sin. The slave does not have a permanent place in the household; the son has a place there forever. So if the Son makes you free, you will be free indeed.
- **1 Peter 2:24.** He himself bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that, free from sins, we might live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed.

But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.
- 2 Timothy 1:10. but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Savior Christ Jesus, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel.

- **Acts 10:40-41.** but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead.

- **Romans 1:4.** and [he] was declared to be Son of God with power according to the spirit of holiness by resurrection from the dead, Jesus Christ our Lord,

2. This week, we continue our discussion of the Second Article of the Apostles’ Creed:

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended into hell. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

As a man, Christ did not always or fully use or manifest the divine powers and majesty that were communicated to his human nature. This began with the lowly manner of his incarnation, continued in the manner of his birth and life, and was completed with his death and burial. We call this his state of humiliation.

Please read **Philippians 2:5-8** and **2 Corinthians 8:9**. How do these passages help you understand the reason for Jesus’ state of humiliation during his earthly ministry?

3. Please read the following passages. Beside each, write down what the passage tells you about Jesus and the fact that he willingly chose to be “limited” in such surprising ways during his earthly ministry.

- Luke 2:7
- Matthew 24:36
- John 11:38-44

4. Please read **Matthew 4:1-11** and **Matthew 26:36-46** and respond to the following items:

- In your own words, what does it mean to you that Jesus underwent these temptations and trials?
- What was the nature of the temptation in each passage?
- What connections can you make between these passages and your own life and experience?

5. Please reflect on the following passages about Jesus' suffering, death and burial:

- **Matthew 27** (from your Bible)
- **John 19** (from your Bible)
- **Luke 23:52-53**. This man went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Then he took it down, wrapped it in a linen cloth, and laid it in a rock-hewn tomb where no one had ever been laid.

How do you relate Jesus' suffering and death to your own experience?

6. Jesus, who remains true man, also manifests the divine attributes communicated to him in his incarnation. His power and majesty are manifest fully in his victorious descent into hell, his resurrection from the dead, his ascension into heaven, his present reign at the right hand of the Father, and his future return for judgment. We call this his *state of exaltation*.

During his earthly ministry (before Good Friday), we see glimpses, here and there, of God's divine power in Jesus, especially in his healings, miracles, and exorcisms. Jesus downplayed these demonstrations of his power. In fact, he regularly told people not to talk about them. Why? Because his ultimate mission was not to show his own power but rather to give it away for everyone else on the cross. Nevertheless, the flashes of amazing power we do see in Jesus' life serve the purpose of telling us that here, indeed, is our all-powerful God in the flesh. Please read the following passages.

- **John 2:11**. Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.
- **Luke 6:8**. Even though he knew what they were thinking, he said to the man who had the withered hand, "Come and stand here." He got up and stood there.
- **Matthew 17:1-2**. Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and his brother John and led them up a high mountain, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became dazzling white.

In your own words, what do these passages tell you about Jesus?

Below, write about a time when you experienced what you would say was God's miraculous power; be prepared to share it with your group.

While we do appreciate stories of people dying, going to heaven, and coming back (and we grant that these things can happen), why are peoples' miraculous experiences of the "afterlife" not the type of thing we count on, as Christians?

Can you think of instances/examples from your own experience where someone (perhaps yourself) was looking for God to be a miracle worker, and was disappointed?

For Christians, miracles are wonderful signs that God is present in our lives. At the same time, we know that our faith is not built on miraculous signs. In your own words, why does the New Testament downplay “signs and wonders” even while acknowledging that we should be thankful for them?

7. Reflect on the following passages. Then respond to them: how do they help you understand Jesus’ exaltation and what his victorious resurrection means to you personally.

- **1 Peter 3:18-20.** For Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water.
- **Colossians 2:15.** He disarmed the rulers and authorities and made a public example of them, triumphing over them in it.
- **Mark 16:6.** But he said to them, “Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him.
- **Luke 24:50-51.** Then he led them out as far as Bethany, and, lifting up his hands, he blessed them. While he was blessing them, he withdrew from them and was carried up into heaven.
- **Hebrews 1:3.** He is the reflection of God’s glory and the exact imprint of God’s very being, and he sustains all things by his powerful word. When he had made purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high,
- **Hebrews 8:1.** Now the main point in what we are saying is this: we have such a high priest, one who is seated at the right hand of the throne of the Majesty in the heavens.
- **Acts 17:31.** Because God has fixed a day on which he will have the world judged in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed, and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead.”

*I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from eternity, and also true man, born of the Virgin Mary, is my Lord, who has redeemed me, a lost and condemned person, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with his holy, precious blood and with his innocent suffering and death, **that I may be his own and live under him in***

is kingdom and serve him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as he is risen from the dead, and reigns to all eternity. This is most certainly true.

hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied. But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died.

- **Colossians 3:1-4.** So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth, for you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is your life is revealed, then you also will be revealed with him in glory.

In the Small Catechism, Luther begins his summary of the Third Article of the Creed with the following words:

I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with his gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith.

3. "I believe...that I cannot believe." As fallen people, we are unable to find God on our own, let alone choose to entrust our lives to him. Which is harder to accept—(a) that I choose to believe or (b) that I am brought to saving faith apart from my own efforts? Your thoughts on this:

4. Please read **Acts 9:1-22**, about Paul's conversion, and **Acts 16:13-15**, about Lydia's conversion. What role did Paul and/or Lydia play in their conversion?

5. The *Large Catechism* states: "As Christians, we confess that the Holy Spirit has made us new creatures by bringing us to saving faith in Jesus Christ. Such faith is granted to our hearts by the Holy Spirit through the preaching of the gospel." In the space below, express your understanding of this teaching: that even our faith in the gospel comes to us from outside ourselves. How and where does this happen, according to your understanding?

6. Please reflect on the following passages and use them to respond to the question: "*How was I brought under the gracious lordship of Jesus?*"

- **Romans 10:13-15.** For, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved." But how are they to call on one in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in one of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone to proclaim him? And how are they to proclaim him unless they are sent? As it is written, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!"
- **Hebrews 4:12.** For the word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul and spirit, and of the joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart.
- **John 4:39-42.** Many Samaritans from that city believed in him because of the woman's testimony, "He told me everything I have ever done." So when the Samaritans came to him, they asked him to stay with them; and he stayed there two days. And many more believed because of his word. They said to the woman, "It is no longer because of what you said that we believe, for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is truly the Savior of the world."

- **1 Corinthians 12:3.** Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says “Let Jesus be cursed!” and no one can say “Jesus is Lord” except by the Holy Spirit.
- **John 6:65.** And he said, “For this reason I have told you that no one can come to me unless it is granted by the Father.”

Your response:

7. Reflect on the following passages and use them to respond to the question: “*Why can I not come to faith in Jesus by my own reason or strength?*”

- **1 Corinthians 2:14.** Those who are unspiritual do not receive the gifts of God’s Spirit, for they are foolishness to them, and they are unable to understand them because they are spiritually discerned.
- **Ephesians 2:1.** You were dead through the trespasses and sins.
- **Acts 7:51.** “You stiff-necked people, uncircumcised in heart and ears, you are forever opposing the Holy Spirit, just as your ancestors used to do.
- **Romans 8:7.** For this reason the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God’s law—indeed it cannot.
- **Galatians 5:17.** For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want.

8. The reason you don’t hear Lutherans speaking in terms like “you need to make a decision to accept Jesus” is that we firmly follow the biblical teaching that human beings cannot come to faith in God through their own reason, strength, or by any choice they make. Instead, we emphasize the Holy Spirit’s work of calling us and bringing us to faith through the Gospel. The gospel always comes to us as an external word. As is made clear in the passages from #6, above, the word comes to us initially from other human beings. This is just one of the reasons we Lutherans really emphasize the importance of the Church in the world. In the space below, please share your thoughts on this.

9. Please reflect on the following passages, and use them to respond to the question: “*What does it mean that the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel?*”

- **Romans 1:16.** For I am not ashamed of the gospel; it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who has faith, to the Jew first and also to the Greek.
- **Romans 10:17.** So faith comes from what is heard, and what is heard comes through the word of Christ.
- **2 Thessalonians 2:14.** For this purpose he called you through our proclamation of the good news, so that you may obtain the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ.

- **1 Peter 1:23, 25.** You have been born anew, not of perishable but of imperishable seed, through the living and enduring word of God. But the word of the Lord endures forever. That word is the good news that was announced to you.
- **Ephesians 1:13.** In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit;

Your response:

10. It is very helpful to remember that the Word of God is not just information that we read and interpret. The Bible consistently speaks of the Word as having **power** (e.g. God created the world through his Word). So, the Word does not just come to us as textbook information which we decide whether or not to accept; on the contrary the Word has the power to change us when we hear it. The word *delivers* what it says. With this in mind, please share your thoughts on the following passages:

- **Acts 4:31.** When they had prayed, the place in which they were gathered together was shaken; and they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and spoke the word of God with boldness.
- **1 Thessalonians 2:13.** We also constantly give thanks to God for this, that when you received the word of God that you heard from us, you accepted it not as a human word but as what it really is, God's word, which is also at work in you believers.
- **Isaiah 55:11.** So is my word that goes out from my mouth: It will not return to me empty, but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for which I sent it.

Your response (what particularly strikes you from the passages and why):

11. Can you think of a time when the Holy Spirit, working through God's Word (or through perhaps a sermon, class, or a conversation with another believer), did not just make you "think" differently, but actually changed your heart? If so, describe the experience and be prepared to share it with your group.

12. Reflect on the following passages and use them to answer the question: "*What does it mean to be sanctified by the Spirit?*"

- **1 Corinthians 6:11.** And this is what some of you used to be. But you were washed, you were sanctified, you were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and in the Spirit of our God.
- **Hebrews 10:10.** And it is by God's will that we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all.
- **Psalms 51:10.** Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me.
- **Galatians 5:22-23.** By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things.
- **Ephesians 2:10.** For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.
- **Titus 2:14.** He it is who gave himself for us that he might redeem us from all iniquity and purify for himself a people of his own who are zealous for good deeds.

- **Hebrews 11:6.** And without faith it is impossible to please God, for whoever would approach him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who seek him.

- **2 Corinthians 5:17.** So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!

- **1 Peter 1:5.** [you] are being protected by the power of God through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time.
- **Jude 22-25.** And have mercy on some who are wavering; save others by snatching them out of the fire; and have mercy on still others with fear, hating even the tunic defiled by their bodies. Now to him who is able to keep you from falling, and to make you stand without blemish in the presence of his glory with rejoicing, to the only God our Savior, through Jesus Christ our Lord, be glory, majesty, power, and authority, before all time and now and forever. Amen.

9. Note: The Bible (and Jesus himself) sometimes speaks in terms of *predestination*. This the idea that God has pre-planned everything, including who will be in heaven and who will not. In those passages where this idea is strong, it is clear that God is provoking us to think seriously about our status with him.

It is really impossible for us to accept the idea that we have no free will—that we are “hemmed in” by a plan that is beyond our power to change. However, the Bible confirms that on our own—if we are left with nothing but our own free will and with the consequences of our own choices—we are certainly doomed, and our freedom will turn out to be nothing but a mirage that lures us further into a dead-end.

The point of pre-destination language in the Bible is not only to affirm the truth that God is in control of everything (which can be comforting), but also to make us *uncomfortable*. It confirms that we can do nothing for ourselves when it comes to salvation. Only God can give us a future, by his sovereign will.

At the same time, as Lutherans we understand that we should not think of salvation/damnation as if everything is working according to a closed, pre-arranged system. If this were the case, what would

God's point be in sending Jesus into the world? If everything is pre-planned, why would we need a Savior to enter into our lives and call us to him? The whole point of Jesus is that in him, our destiny *changes*. Throughout the gospels, we see "prostitutes, tax collectors and sinners" turning to him and finding new life in him.

The point is, by our own power, we cannot change our destiny. But "with God, all things are possible" (Matthew 19:23-26). God takes pre-destined goats and re-makes them into sheep with a new future, through Jesus. He is the Lamb of God who became a goat for our sake. Jesus trades his life for ours, and makes it possible to have a future that we would never gain by our free choices. Without Jesus, our human freedom of choice *always leads us astray* because it gives us the false impression that we can choose our ultimate destiny. With Jesus, however, we are brought into a relationship with God that only he can make possible. With faith in Jesus, and in a renewed relationship with God, our freedom takes on its proper function: to choose how we will serve and love and praise him each day. Rather than using our freedom to "win our destiny for ourselves," in Christ we leave our destiny to God, and use our freedom to make small choices as to how we will show our love for him and for others.

To think more about this difficult topic, please read **Matthew 25:31-46**. In the space below, share your thoughts on this awesome passage paying special attention to the disturbing language of predestination which Jesus uses.

10. Reflect on the following passages and let them guide your response to the following question: "*Can we be truly spiritual without the Holy Spirit and the Gospel?*"

- **John 1:18**. No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known.
- **John 3:31-32**. The one who comes from above is above all; the one who is of the earth belongs to the earth and speaks about earthly things. The one who comes from heaven is above all. He testifies to what he has seen and heard, yet no one accepts his testimony.
- **Romans 10:17**. So faith comes from what is heard, and what is heard comes through the word of Christ.
- **1 Corinthians 2:9-11**. But, as it is written, "What no eye has seen, nor ear heard, nor the human heart conceived, what God has prepared for those who love him"—these things God has revealed to us through the Spirit; for the Spirit searches everything, even the depths of God. For what human being knows what is truly human except the human spirit that is within? So also no one comprehends what is truly God's except the Spirit of God.

The word catholic carries a wonderful meaning of “many varieties united into one body.” Confusion sometimes arises around this, because when catholic is capitalized—as in Catholic—it’s usually referring specifically to the Roman Catholic church based in Rome, with the Pope and etc. Why do you think that many western protestant churches, about fifty years ago, purposely went back to using the original word “catholic” with a small “c” when we write the Creed, or say it together?

Your response:

4. Reflect on the following passages, and let them guide your response to the question: "*Why must we firmly maintain this teaching of forgiveness—the doctrine of justification by grace, for Christ's sake, through faith?*"

- **Acts 4:12.** There is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among mortals by which we must be saved.
- **Romans 3:21-25** (from your Bible)

- **Galatians 5:4-5.** You who want to be justified by the law have cut yourselves off from Christ; you have fallen away from grace. For through the Spirit, by faith, we eagerly wait for the hope of righteousness.
- **Revelation 1:5-6.** ...and from Jesus Christ, the faithful witness, the firstborn of the dead, and the ruler of the kings of the earth. To him who loves us and freed us from our sins by his blood, and made us to be a kingdom, priests serving his God and Father, to him be glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen.
- **Romans 5:1-14** (from your Bible)\

Your response:

5. As Lutheran Christians, we know that the Church as it exists within the world today is filled with broken sinners who fall short of the glory of God. Because of this, we refrain from judging whether we are looking at the “true Church” by the *behavior of the people* who call themselves Christian. If we did that, all congregations would show more and more warts, the closer we examined them.

Rather, as Lutherans we identify the Church in the world by just a couple of basic characteristics—we call them “marks of the Church”—that are not based in human behavior, but rather in God’s gospel promises. Specifically, we Lutherans say that “wherever the gospel is preached in its purity, and the sacraments are administered rightly” is where the Church will be found.

Notice that according to this standard, for Lutherans, it doesn’t matter what denominational titles people assign to themselves...whether Lutheran, Catholic, Methodist, Nazarene, etc. The Church is the Church wherever the word is preached truly and the sacraments (Baptism and Communion) rightly given. Both of these marks—word and sacrament—are based in God’s action for us, and not in our response to God.

For example, some Christian groups think that true believers will speak in tongues, or speak in terms of “having a born again experience.” Notice that these practices are more about a *human response to God* than they are about what God has done in Jesus Christ. Lutherans have no problem with these human responses to God...we just don’t count them as essential marks of the true Church.

With this in mind, think of a time (if you can) when you felt that other Christians were judging whether you or others were “real Christians” based on your behavior, the way you talk, your religious practices, or special spiritual experiences. What was the situation? In the space below, share how you understand the difference between their standards of “true church” and the Lutheran standards described above.

6. Reflect on the following passages, and let them guide you in your response to the question: “*What are the identifying characteristics of the Church?*”

- **Isaiah 55:10-11.** For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return there until they have watered the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and

bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and succeed in the thing for which I sent it.

- **Romans 10:17.** So faith comes from what is heard, and what is heard comes through the word of Christ.
- **1 Corinthians 10:16.** The cup of blessing that we bless, is it not a sharing in the blood of Christ? The bread that we break, is it not a sharing in the body of Christ?
- **Matthew 18:20.** For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them.

7. Reflect on the following passages, and let them guide you in your response to the question: “*What are some other outward indications that the Church is present?*” (Note: Such things as gatherings for prayer and worship, the fruits of faith, and suffering for Christ also serve as good indications that the church is present *without guaranteeing it.*)

- **John 13:35.** By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.
- **1 Peter 2:21.** For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you should follow in his steps.
- **2 Timothy 1:8.** Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in suffering for the gospel, relying on the power of God,
- **Acts 2:42-43.** They devoted themselves to the apostles’ teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers.
- **Hebrews 10:24-25.** And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

- **1 Peter 2:9.** But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God’s own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light.
- **Acts 8:26-35** (from your Bible)

9. Reflect on the following passages, and let them guide you in your response to the question: “*What are some of the privileges and responsibilities of members of the Church?*”

- **Colossians 3:16.** Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God.
- **2 Corinthians 6:14.** Do not be mismatched with unbelievers. For what partnership is there between righteousness and lawlessness? Or what fellowship is there between light and darkness?
- **2 Timothy 4:3-4.** For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths.
- **Romans 16:17-18.** I urge you, brothers and sisters, to keep an eye on those who cause dissensions and offenses, in opposition to the teaching that you have learned; avoid them. For such people do not serve our Lord Christ, but their own appetites, and by smooth talk and flattery they deceive the hearts of the simple-minded.
- **John 20:21.** Jesus said to them again, “Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you.”
- **Luke 10:2.** He said to them, “The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest.”
- **Galatians 6:6.** Those who are taught the word must share in all good things with their teacher.

10. Reflect on the following passages, and let them guide you in your response to the question: “*What are some of our responsibilities toward other Christians and church bodies?*”

- **Ephesians 4:3-6.** Make every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all.
- **1 Corinthians 1:10.** Now I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you be in agreement and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same purpose.
- **John 17:17-21** (from your Bible)
- **Matthew 18:21-35** (from your Bible)

11. Reflect on the following passages, and let them guide you in your response to the question: “*Will the Church always exist?*”

- **Matthew 16:18.** And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it.

- **Matthew 28:20.** "...And teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

12. Reflect on the following passages, think about your own experiences as a believer, and let the passages guide you in your response to the question: "*Should I expect the Church's life to be one of continual peace and harmony?*"

- John 16:33. I have said this to you, so that in me you may have peace. In the world you face persecution. But take courage; I have conquered the world!"
- Ephesians 6:12. For our struggle is not against enemies of blood and flesh, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers of this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places.
- 1 Peter 4:12-14. Beloved, do not be surprised at the fiery ordeal that is taking place among you to test you, as though something strange were happening to you. But rejoice insofar as you are sharing Christ's sufferings, so that you may also be glad and shout for joy when his glory is revealed. - **Revelation 7:17.** For the Lamb at the center of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of the water of life, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes.
- **Revelation 21:4.** He will wipe every tear from their eyes. Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more, for the first things have passed away."

5. Reflect on the following passages, and let them guide your response to the question: “*What will my resurrected body be like?*”

- **Philippians 3:21.** He will transform the body of our humiliation[a] that it may be conformed to the body of his glory, by the power that also enables him to make all things subject to himself.
- **1 Corinthians 15:42-43.** So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power.

6. Reflect on the following passages, and let them guide your response to the question: “*What will happen on the Last Day to those who have rejected Christ (unbelievers)?*”

10. Please read the following and share your thoughts concerning some popular *false* teachings about the end of time and everlasting life.

- **Millennialism** typically teaches a literal thousand-year visible reign of Christ on earth before the final judgment, not recognizing that the Scriptures often use numbers symbolically. Lutherans and most Christian churches understand the 1000-year reign of Christ in Revelation 20:4-6 as a symbolic reference to Christ's reign over his Church on earth from his ascension until the last day (1 Corinthians 15:52). Teachings such as millennialism tend to complicate our faith and lead us away from daily trust in Jesus into fruitless speculation about things we'll never understand. Some groups use these esoteric teachings (like millennialism) simply to stand apart from other believers.
- **Rapture** teachings claims that the thousand-year reign follows a secret return of Jesus, when believers are "caught up...in the air" and removed from the earth. This turns the simple, comforting hope of Christ's second coming (1 Thessalonians 4:13-18) into complicated stages (contrary to 1 Thessalonians 5:1-3; Hebrews 9:27-28; John 5:28-29); denies that believers will suffer Satan's tribulations (contrary to Matthew 24:9; Acts 14:22); and claims that those who reject Christ will have a second chance to achieve salvation during an earthly reign (contrary to Luke 16:27-31; Revelation 20:11-15)

Perhaps the main question to ask about these teachings: why do you think some Christian groups talk about the end of time and final judgment in terms that are *more complicated* than what the Bible actually teaches about the end of time? What do we think we might gain by adding "stages" to the end of time? Share your thoughts, below:

11. Please think and pray about your next step *going into the deeper water with Christ*. By this time, you will know what our next "Going Deeper" focus will be, starting At your upcoming small group meeting, you will be discussing with your partner(s) whether you will continue as a group or reconfigure.

12. Please consider writing a blurb about your experience so far with going deeper with Christ for our church newsletter (the Eagle) and/or our website.

13. Look back at your partners' prayer concerns from your last meeting. Make sure to pray for them now. Among your other closing prayers, please ask God to bless your small group and the congregation of St. John's as we follow Jesus' call to go into the deep water with Christ and become more confident, effective "fishers of people."
