Letter from the Associate Pastor

"And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger.

If you had good news, who would you tell first? The most important people, I bet.

The ones who would be most likely to understand and share your joy. But when God had the best news of the ages, whom did He tell first? Important religious people? Wealthy folk? Learned scholars? Not a chance.

It is to poor, unclean night laborers that the angel, backed up by a multitude of the heavenly host, appears, and upon whom the glory of the Lord shines. That'll bring you to your knees and make your heart skip a beat, huh? Like when you see flashing lights in your rearview mirror - times 10,000! But expecting the worst, they received the best. Glory to God in the Highest! Yes. But also, Glory to God in the Lowest, for He stoops to be born in a manger, and reveals himself to outcast hirelings pulling the graveyard shift. This "stooping" of God means that He is never far removed from us, or our circumstances, whatever they may be.

Because God "stoops", these shepherds are able to trade their great fear for great joy! Joy, because a new ruler has been born! A ruler unlike Augustus and other selfish tyrants whose demands make life miserable for their subjects, and unlike even the misplaced longings that too often rule our own hearts, leaving us empty. No, this King is both just and loving. And though His dominion is everlasting, His power is displayed, not by force, but by loving sacrifice.

This good news for all people, this peace and goodwill toward man, has come to our broken and confused world, in Jesus the Messiah! Spiritually speaking, we are outcasts because of sin - peasants with nothing worthy to offer a Holy God. When we repent of our sin and trust in Jesus the King we will be saved. When this happens, we have no reason to fear any longer, there is no more condemnation! See, He is a good King who gives us what we do not deserve out of His own good pleasure. His salvation moves us from the darkness of sin into the glorious light of his righteousness! His salvation moves us from being outcast peasants in fear to experiencing the riches of joy in fellowship with God!

This season is not only a reminder of Christ's birth, but a call to look forward when He will come again. One day our King will return, and all things will be made new. We will experience His glory and presence free from the poverty of our sinful natures, free from the brokenness of this world. I don't know about you but I long for that day. And Christ's birth announcement is a proclamation that our God reigns, that His kingdom has been established. Those of us who have placed our trust in this King can proclaim with the Shepherds, with the Angels, that there is a rich wholeness in His salvation:

> Suddenly a great company of the heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God, and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests." Luke 2:8-14

TIPS FOR HANDLING THE HOLIDAYS WHEN GRIEVING

- DECIDE WHAT YOU CAN HANDLE COMFORTABLY AND LET FAMILY AND FRIENDS KNOW. Can I handle the responsibility of the family dinner, etc. or shall I ask someone else to do it? Do I want to talk about my loved one or not? Shall I stay here for the holidays or go to a completely different environment?
- 2. MAKE SOME CHANGES IF THEY FEEL COMFORTABLE FOR YOU. Open presents Christmas Eve instead of Christmas morning. Vary the timing of gift giving. Have dinner at a different time or place. Let the children take over decorating the house, the tree, baking and food preparation, etc.
- 3. RE-EXAMINE YOUR PRIORITIES: GREETING CARDS, HOLIDAY BAKING, DECORATING, PUTTING UP A TREE, FAMILY DINNER, ETC. Do I really enjoy doing this? Is this a task that can be shared?
- 4. CONSIDER DOING SOMETHING SPECIAL FOR SOMEONE ELSE. Donate a gift in the memory of your loved one. Donate money you would have spent on your loved one as a gift to charity. Adopt a needy family for the holidays. Invite a guest (foreign student, senior citizen) to share festivities.
- 5. RECOGNIZE YOUR LOVED ONE'S PRESENCE IN THE FAMILY. Burn a special candle to quietly include your loved one. Hang a stocking for your loved one in which people can put notes with their thoughts or feelings. Listen to music especially like by the deceased. Look at photographs.
- 6. IF YOU DECIDE TO DO HOLIDAY SHOPPING, MAKE A LST AHEAD OF TIME AND KEEP IT HANDY FOR A GOOD DAY, OR SHOP ONLINE OR THROUGH CATALOGS.
- 7. OBSERVE THE HOLIDAYS IN WAYS WHICH ARE COMFORTABLE FOR YOU. There is no right or wrong way of handling holidays. Once you've decided how to observe the time, let others know.
- 8. TRY TO GET ENOUGH REST HOLIDAYS CAN BE EMOTIONALLY AND PHYSICALLY DRAINING.
- 9. ALLOW YOURSELF TO EXPRESS YOUR FEELINGS. Holidays often magnify feelings of loss. It is natural to feel sadness. Share concerns, apprehensions, feelings with a friend. The need for support is often greater during holidays.
- 10. KEEP IN MIND THAT THE EXPERIENCE OF MANY BEREAVED PERSONS IS THAT THEY DO COME TO ENJOY HOLIDAYS AGAIN. THERE WILL BE OTHER HOLIDAY SEASONS TO CELEBRATE.
- 11. DON'T BE AFRAID TO HAVE FUN. Laughter and joy are not disrespectful. Give yourself and your family members' permission to celebrate and take pleasure in the holidays.

MISSION FALL BAZAAR: ANOTHER SUCCESS!!!


