Thank you for holding us in your hearts and prayers as we extended the love of Christ and St. John's to all the children!



b. WE HOPE TO HAVE A YOUTH MINISTER WHO ...

- will equip and train children to take leadership roles in worship.
- will encourage youth to take part in service projects and learning by *doing* (the disciples not only listened to Jesus teach, they followed what he did).
- will show up and be present at church activities: "make the rounds" so that families see that the minister is involved, engaged, approachable and accessible.
- will constantly search for new ways the youth can serve, so that activities will maintain fresh life and energy.
- is always learning and growing in their own Christian faith, so that they model a life of continual learning and growth for the youth.
- will model a sense of healthy, Christ-centered family for so many of our youth who are coming from challenging family situations.

c. Discuss the Bible's role in youth ministry. What kind of special training, if any, do you think will be important for the new youth minister? How do you think scripture is most effectively taught in a youth ministry setting?

- The Bible must be central to youth activities. We hope that all our youth activities, as much as possible, will be immersion experiences in the Word of God.
- We hope to have a youth minister who will have a powerful sense of the grand narrative of scripture, and who will be able to make broad connections between overarching Bible themes and everyday life.
- We hope our youth minister will be skilled with Christian apologetics, so they can teach our children not only basic Christian beliefs, but how to confidently explain to others *why* they believe what they do, and *why* they don't put their trust in humanistic or other alternatives.
- We hope our youth minister will be open to using all sorts of tools (drama, music, fun activities) to convey and teach God's Word.
- We hope our youth minister has a good understanding of how children learn information and wisdom most effectively. Experiential learning (e.g. service projects, mission activities, mission trips) solidifies Biblical learning and makes it memorable.

Summary of Our "Looking Forward" Youth Ministry Discussions, continued.

II. Where God Is Leading Us

a. With a view to the trends and challenges identified in question "c" above, express what ideal qualities and strengths you would like to see fostered in our youth through their participation in church activities. What are some of the most important faith-based strengths we want to instill in our children for these times?

- We want our young people to know God, the true and unending source of hope.
- We pray that our young people's confidence in God will be so strong that they will not only be passive believers, but also servant leaders.
- We want our youth to be steeped in God's Word, so that they can constantly make connections between God's Word and today's world.
- We want our children to know where to turn in all their trials, with all their questions.
- We want our children to have a strong sense of identity in Christ.
- We want our youth to have a powerful, God-centered sense of self-esteem.
- We pray that our youth will become influencers for Jesus.

b. With a view to the above, what ideal qualities and strengths do you think will be especially important in a youth minister moving forward?

WE HOPE TO HAVE A YOUTH MINISTER WHO ...

- will be so deeply rooted and confident in Christ that he/she can be approachable, and connect with people wherever they are at in life.
- will continue to nurture relationships between young people and a variety of adults and other children in the church.
- does not so much need to be the center of attention as he/she is more of a behind-the-scenes initiator, organizer, and facilitator of Christ-centered relationships in the church.
- will be confident and form strong ideas for his/her own program, and at the same time be open to feedback and input from parents/youth.
- will be in regular formal communication with Laurie and Diana while they continue in their ministry, and that the three youth ministers will work as a team, learning from and inspiring each other.
- will utilize external resources to keep learning and growing in their ministry (including being part of a youth leader network).
- will be willing to get involved in formal training for youth ministry as needed in the early stages of his/her ministry with us.
- is mature and has had some experience "in the trenches." While his/her biological age will not necessarily be a factor, we need a person who does not identify as *one of* the youth. Since the world/culture is divided right now and children are forced to constantly question their own identity and self-worth, a youth minister needs to be lovingly firm about setting healthy boundaries and very confident in his/her Christian identity. A *mature* and reflective Christian faith will thus be very important.
- will be accepting, loving, understanding, and who will work to welcome children who are living in challenging circumstances. Experience with children who deal with mental health issues (depression, ADD, etc.) will be helpful.
- will be Jesus-centered in everything they do.
- will constantly encourage and model a life of prayer.
- will be wise to the pitfalls of technology, but also be willing and able to use technology to further the Kingdom of God.
- will be able to share personal experiences with the youth (as appropriate) to help model Christian faith and help them see the minister as "living proof" of the Gospel.

- how one of the main goals of our youth ministry is to have Christian ministry *come from the kids*.
- how our youth leaders get out and go to youth events in the community.
- how our youth ministers are skilled at listening to individual youth and observing them in order to discern how they could best put their skills and talents to work for Jesus.
- how our youth ministers always encourage feedback from youth and the congregation at large.
- how our youth ministers can be flexible and adapt to changing circumstances.
- our youth ministers' high level of interpersonal skill.
- how our youth ministers try to reach out and connect with each and every child.
- how our program encourages youth to support and minister to each other.

b. What do you think we need to carefully and lovingly preserve in our youth ministry going forward?

- We hope our youth ministers will continue to go outside the immediate church context and make broad connections with youth, meeting them "where they're at" in the world, so that the youth can understand that Christ is not just King in a particular location, but in every aspect of life.
- We treasure the *Faith Webbing* approach to youth ministry that Gary and Laurie have introduced at St. John's, where the ideal is that each youth is surrounded by an intergenerational web of people who are supporting them, and who are walking alongside them on their faith journey.
- We hope our youth ministry will continue to instill a strong desire in our youth to be servant leaders.
- We hope our youth ministry leader(s) will continue to be listeners first, to be aware and respectful of the many different backgrounds/contexts from which each of our children is coming.
- We want our youth ministers to continue to be deeply rooted and grounded in the Bible, and to make God's Word the center of each and every youth activity, since it is the only true guide for life and salvation.

c. What do you think are some recent trends and special challenges we are facing in our ministry to youth (positive and/or concerning), due to a changing culture (locally and/or nationwide)?

- Children are questioning themselves and their identity more than ever. Without a strong core, they can feel like they are being torn down constantly without being built up.
- There are strong external forces at work, pressuring young people to fit into neat categories and to be members of opposing "teams."
- Powerful forces are continually demanding youth to answer: "Who are you? What is true?"
- Children are faced with a deeply divided world right now (including divisions that reach into congregations). They generally feel more like they are under more pressure and on their own, in a colder world.
- For most parents, sports and many other activities have become more important than church for their children. They are focusing on the utilitarian value of activities rather than the relational, and truth value, of activities. They are trying to help their children towards a future of accomplishments, but in doing so are teaching their children that their lives are rooted in their own successes and failures.
- The external culture has stopped supporting Christian faith. It will take much more time and intentional effort for the Church to build young people up in their Christian identity.
- The divisions in our society have created an atmosphere of harshness and knee-jerk judgment in almost every area of community life. Empathy has become a rare quality.
- The Church, more than ever, needs to be a refuge and a safe place where relationships of trust are nurtured over the long haul for young people. *(continued on next page)*

Summary of Our "Looking Forward" Youth Ministry Discussions

St. John's is embarking on a search for a new youth minister who will work with our 7th-12th grade students. On the Sundays of July 30th and August 6th, a group of members responded to an open invitation to get together and discuss the following material. The rough results of our discussions, presented below, will not only help guide our search and interview process, but will eventually be integrated into a strong and focused youth ministry plan. We are so thankful to all of our members who are participating in this process! We want to share the results with the congregation here, because youth ministry is such an important part of who we are (and who we will be!) at St. John's.

I. Where God Has Led Us

a. What do you especially love and appreciate about St. John's youth ministry? WE ARE THANKFUL FOR:

- the huge amounts of love, care, energy and resources that so many people in the congregation invest in youth ministry.
- the intergenerational connections and relationships which Laurie, Gary, and Diana have fostered within the congregation for the sake of the youth.
- how the youth ministers have focused on training and empowering the youth to become Christian leaders in their own right.
- how so many different adults are encouraged to interact with youth in all activities.
- how our youth ministers instill a sense of "personal ownership" in our youth for their own faith. They do this by giving them tools to put their faith into action.
- how our youth ministers provide the youth with "scaffolding"—all the support they need underneath them as they venture into active Christian ministry, and then how they carefully withdraw the scaffolding as time goes on so that each youth can stand more on his/her own as a Christian servant and witness.
- how our youth ministers are deeply rooted in the Lutheran Christian tradition, which enables them to convey the eternal truth of the Gospel creatively in circumstances which are always changing. (continued on next page)

Letter from the Associate Pastor



The angel swung his sickle on the earth, gathered its grapes and threw them into the areat winepress of God's wrath. - Revelation 14:19.

As a kid growing up in Lancaster County, PA, known for its Amish farming community among other things, I would watch with fascination as crops were planted, tended, and eventually harvested. The best part was at the end of the season, because the crops

would be harvested and sold to the local markets and especially Central Market in downtown Lancaster, where we would often roam the many halls and stalls to reap the fruits of their labor. Sweet corn like no other, fresh tomatoes, peas, beans - you name it, it was there.

The Bible often uses the harvest as an image of God's judgment. At the end of days, God will gather up our life's work and measure its eternal value. Judgment may be favorable, for a crop worth preserving. Or it may involve destruction. This idea of judgment doesn't sit easily with most people today. Because tolerance and acceptance are two of our society's highest and most rewarded values, we often operate with an "I'm OK, you're OK" mentality. But according to Revelation, God does not.

Scripture reminds us time and again that we are NOT okay. We are sinners with a tendency to rebel against the Lord. And because he is holy and just, evil has no place in his presence. According to this text, then, God is also in the messy business of straining and separating people and their deeds. Does the abuse, violence, manipulation, and hurt in the world trouble you? Praise God that there will come a time when all that has been inflicted on us-and all that we inflict on others-will be strained out and cast away from God's presence. In his eternal kingdom, only the good will remain.

All of us deserve judgment. But those who trust in Jesus can rest assured that he has already endured the "winepress of God's wrath" for us. This is the victory of the cross. This is the hope to which we are called. Praise God for his harvest of justice and hope!
