

Wow. Words can't suffice to relate this experience, but I shall strive to make them tell a story. I signed up for this trip with some trepidation, as my previous experiences had never focused solely on children. Instead, they gravitated toward construction and humanitarian or disaster relief efforts. Working with children isn't abnormal, but working with children in a foreign country with a language barrier is a little more uncomfortable. My only fear was that my lack of Spanish would cause the children to feel unheard or ignored.

I was highly grateful for the fluent team members and staff, as well as the understanding exhibited by my niños. Julio and Norman were patient with me and showed little frustration when translating my words. The only other gift that surpassed this was seeing both Julio and Norman smile. That, as well as seeing how they interacted with their "family." Both boys exhibited so much compassion and empathy. My favorite memory with them was at the beach as we surfed the waves. God gave us a moment to just "be" and not to think about anything else.

Even though it was a sunny and cloudless Saturday, it was raining from my eyes. It's so hard to let go and trust in God about the future of those kids. But that's what faith is. Our lives are short, but God's love is infinite. Through Him, all things are possible.

Early Church History of St. John's

After discussing with the president of the synod, a call was extended to Dr. L. H. Schuh, who was currently serving as president at Capital University. He eagerly accepted the opportunity to return to working in a congregation. On the first Sunday of July in 1912, he was officially installed as the pastor of St. John's. Utilizing his talents, he immediately set to work reorganizing the Sunday School, which was relocated from the old parish building to the church in order to accommodate more students. He also established a Bible class taught in German. However, a recurring issue within the church resurfaced—the younger generation was not interested in attending services conducted in German, as they struggled to understand the

language. Additionally, choir members were reluctant to sing in German as the words held no meaning for them. In response, Dr. Schuh introduced English preaching, resulting in a significant increase in attendance and growth of the congregation. In January, he also organized the Ladies Aid Society with 14 charter members, whose efforts proved invaluable in overcoming financial obstacles faced by the church. During this time, a new church constitution was adopted and the envelope system was implemented for the first time in the church's financial work. The installation of electricity provided lighting and a motor for the organ. As the pastor's family grew, a larger parsonage was needed and was subsequently built. However, in December of 1915, Dr. Schuh received a call to a church in Toledo. Despite the turmoil within the church he was being called to, the synod pressured him to accept the call. In January of 1915, Dr. Schuh preached his farewell sermon to St. John's. Emmanuel Poppen graduated from Capital University's seminary at the young age of 20, earning him the nickname "The Boy Preacher." As a condition for accepting the call to John's, Pastor Poppen requested to remain with his current congregation until after Easter, which was approximately four months. During this time, Dr. R. S. H. Lenski of Capital University served as a supply pastor. In the short period that Dr. Lenski was in charge, Sunday School attendance reached a record high of 260. Pastor Poppen was officially installed as the pastor of St. John's on the third Sunday of April in 1915. Within the first week of his arrival, the church organist resigned and Mrs. Poppen was asked to take over the role. In 1917, the church underwent renovations and redecoration, costing a total of \$2,500. As part of the improvements, the organ and choir loft were relocated from the balcony to the west transept.

Three elements must be in place for any type of crime to occur. There is a victim, an assailant and an opportunity. By learning these safety strategies, you will remove the opportunity for an assailant to make you their next victim. These basic tips and strategies can help reduce your odds of becoming a victim of a crime.

Deputy Stahr is not a stranger to St. John's. Laura and her two young daughters attended church here a few years ago. Mark your calendars to join us!

Letter from the Intern

One of the things I have noticed about this congregation is the thriving ministry to youth and children. I have known churches who want to have the focus on kids that St. John's has, but it is rare to find such a program running smoothly and for so many church members to contribute time, effort, and prayer to it. It has been a blessing to see and experience to many people passing on the faith to younger generations.

It reminds me of Deuteronomy 6, in which the LORD—through Moses—tells all of Israel to love God with all they have and to pass on that love and obedience to future generations. Obedience to this command is most clearly seen in the rituals of the Jewish Passover meal (the Seder).

For the last 3,000 years (give or take) Jewish elders have sat down at tables on the first night of Passover, looked into the eyes of the children in the room, and told the story of God rescuing *them* from slavery in Egypt. Whether in 1st century Jerusalem or 21st century Brooklyn, this tale of miracles and freedom, death and redemption is woven into the lives of each member of the meal. Each person who listens is woven into this ancient story, as well.

Recently, Pastor Patti allowed me to shadow her during a funeral. In her sermon, Pastor Patti spoke of the departed person and grief—but also of comfort, hope, and God's promises. Afterward, she explained to me how our stories are woven into God's story. That that's what she does with funeral sermons... She weaves that person's story into God's story.

During Holy Week, we Christians do the same thing. We tell the story of the Messiah riding into Jerusalem, and <u>we</u> shout out "Hosanna!" We sit quietly on Thursday and listen to Christ's words and commands and eat a meal <u>with him</u>. On Friday <u>we</u> hear Jesus' cry from the cross: "it is finished..." and leave in silence—just as he bowed his head and was silent. On Easter morning, <u>we</u> hear the unbelievable news that Jesus is risen—just as the women at the tomb reported!

Our story becomes a part of *the* Story... The Story of God bringing back his rebellious creatures and making whole his broken people. This is the story the Bible tells from Genesis 1 to Revelation 22. It is the story into which we are swept up each Sunday: we confess and are forgiven. God speaks and we listen. We pray and offer up our gifts. We receive the bread and wine—Christ himself—which is a meal of miracles and freedom, death and redemption.

May we continue to be wrapped up in God's Story of redemption every day. May we keep telling this story to everyone among us—young and old. And may we celebrate these next weeks as though the risen Christ himself is among us, because—after all—he is!

Alleluia, He is Risen!


